December Survival Tips: Winter Preparedness

As December brings snowy conditions, being prepared is essential. Here are key survival tips and tools for winter driving:

Essential Tools:

- **Emergency Kit:** Blankets, flashlight, first aid kit, non-perishable snacks, water, shovel, ice scraper.
- **Winter Tires:** Ensure your vehicle has winter tires for better traction.
- Road Flares/Reflective Triangles: To alert other drivers if stranded.
- **Portable Phone Charger:** Keep your phone ready for emergencies.

If You're Stuck in the Snow:

- 1. Stay Calm: Assess the situation.
- 2. **Stay with Your Vehicle:** It provides shelter and is easier for rescuers to find.
- 3. Turn on Hazard Lights: Signal for help.
- 4. Clear the Exhaust Pipe: Prevent carbon monoxide buildup.
- 5. Call for Help: Contact Your local Towing Company or AMA.
- 6. Conserve Fuel: Run your engine for heat in intervals.
- 7. **Signal for Help:** Use flares or triangles if you have them.
- 8. Stay Active: Move around to keep warm.

Prepare well, drive safely, and enjoy the winter season!

WINTERIZING YOUR HOME



Home Exterior Vents and Meters

Clearing exterior house vents and meters during the winter is essential to ensure proper airflow, prevent ice and snow blockages, and maintain efficient operation of heating systems and appliances. Blocked vents can lead to carbon monoxide buildup, while covered meters can interfere with accurate readings and emergency access.

WILDFIRE RISK REDUCTION



Unattended backyard burn barrels or burn piles are among the most commor ignition points for wildfires. When burning is conducted in close proximity to communities, the risk of negative impacts is heightened

SAFE BURNING PRACTICES: If you must burn...


- Ignite barrels or piles in the evening, avoiding the heat of the day
- Trim grass short and remove any ignitable material from an area at least 3 metres around the
- · Position your burn barrel or pile on exposed soil or rock
- Keep burn barrels or piles at least 30 metres away from structures
- If using a burn barrel, cover top with a mesh screen to reduce risk of embers or sparks escaping Respect regional fire advisories or bans, and don't burn when its hot and dry
- Burn debris in small "batches" not huge "bonfires"
- Keep the fire under control at all times
- Have a hose, water source, or fire extinguisher close by and be ready to use it Monitor your fire at all times, no matter the season - wildfires can happen even in the winter

Multilateral Roundtable Discussion



Emergency management in Canada is a collaborative effort among federal, provincial, and territorial governments, alongside Indigenous partners.

- Local Level: First Nations play a crucial role in managing emergencies.
- Provincial/Territorial Governments: Support local responses and coordination.
- Federal Government: Through Indigenous Services Canada's Emergency Management Assistance Program, they assist with emergencies on reserves, including floods, wildfires, and infrastructure failures.

Understanding these roles is essential for effective preparedness and response.



OUR RECENT ACTIVITIES AND ENDEAVORS



Treaty 8 Emergency Management Meeting



Multilateral conversations are significantly enhancing emergency management within Treaty 8 Territory. Here's how:

- Tribal Council Leadership. A Tribal Council oversees training and emergency coordination for First Nations communities, moving away from provincial management.
- Indigenous Organization Management. An Indigenous organization now handles regional NSMP funding allocations, taking charge of financial resources instead of Indigenous Services Canada (ISC).
- Emergency Operations Support. The establishment of Indigenous Emergency Operations Centers and support for Indigenousled emergency response organizations strengthens local capacities.
- Guaranteed Funding. Each community benefits from guaranteed funding allocations, ensuring they have the resources needed for effective emergency management.
- Service Standards. Clear standards are implemented for processing response and recovery claims, as well as funding application decisions.

Treaty 8 is instrumental in empowering First Nations by promoting self-determination in emergency management, paving the way for the development of various First Nations-led frameworks across Canada, which can also be explored in Alberta.


