### WINTERIZING YOUR HOME




#### **Inspect and Clean Your Heating System**



- **Furnace Inspection:** Have your furnace professionally serviced to ensure it's running efficiently.
- Replace Filters: Replace air filters to improve airflow and heating efficiency.

#### 2024 First Nation Emergency Management Conference







On November 5 and 6, 2024, the KTC Emergency Services team proudly attended the 2024 First Nation Emergency Management Conference, contributing to critical discussions and initiatives to enhance emergency preparedness and resilience in First Nation communities. Key topics explored during the conference included:

- Building Capacity. Strengthening local emergency response capabilities.
- Multilateral Agreements and AEMA Services. Advancing collaboration between agencies.
- Wildland Urban Interface Program. Strategies for managing risks at the intersection of urban areas and natural landscapes.
- Non-Structural Mitigation and FireSmart Program. Reducing risks through proactive measures and community education.
- **Emergency Fire Fighters Program.** Supporting specialized training for First Nation emergency responders.
- 911 on Reserve. Expanding access to critical emergency services in First Nation communities.
- Roles of Tribal Councils and Treaty Organizations in Emergencies. Highlighting the importance of clearly defining roles within the Emergency Management Assistance Program (EMAP).
- Evacuee Tracking and High-Risk Identification. Developing effective strategies to ensure the safety and accountability of individuals during emergencies.

This event underscored the importance of collaboration between First Nation communities, government agencies, and supporting organizations to address unique challenges and foster resilience in the face of emergencies. The KTC Emergency Services team remains committed to advancing these critical efforts and supporting First Nation communities.

#### **KTC Emergency Services Engagement Sessions with Elders**







Community discussions on emergency management are vital because they prepare residents, build trust, and feedback from these discussion help us create tailored response plans that suit local needs. These conversations make people aware of risks, and help identify resources and vulnerabilities within the community that can support emergency plans and preparations. Involving everyone ensures that even the most vulnerable groups receive support, improving overall response and recovery. We scheduled meetings with community Elders in all KTC member Nations, to talk about Emergency Management in our KTC communities and will use the knowledge and perspectives we have gained to better support all KTC Nations.





This information is being collected to pre-register individuals for a potential community evacuation.


To ensure proper registration and facilitate reimbursement for evacuation expenses, we need to gather treaty numbers and household details for each community member.
